COURSE DESCRIPTION ⊗

This course focuses on understanding and interpreting commonly used statistical procedures reported in the literature of various health professions. Content will include descriptive and inferential statistics of univariate and multivariate analyses. Students will acquire knowledge and skills in applying each statistical procedure, its use, interpreting results, and evaluating the study report. Letter Grade

GRADING POLICIES⊛

Grading Scale to be used for all exams and final course grades:

- All assigned coursework must be completed to receive a final course grade and progress in the program.
- In order to receive a passing grade in a GNSG course, a student must achieve a cumulative average of 81% on **exams and quizzes.**
- Students must achieve a minimum grade of B- in all GNSG courses in order to progress in the program.
- Calculation OF GRADEs: Grades/points will not be rounded. For example, 80.5% does not round to 81% resulting in a grade of C+ instead of a B-.
- Students who receive less than a 81% average on exams and quizzes will receive a course grade of no higher than "C+", regardless of total points accrued through written projects and other course assignments.
- EXAMS AND QUIZZES: Students must earn a minimum cumulative average on all exams and quizzes in order to pass the course, regardless of total points accrued through written projects and other course assignments.

TRIGGER WARNING

I acknowledge that each of you comes to PLNU with your own unique life experiences. This contributes to the way you perceive several types of information. In this GNSG 7002 Statistics and Data Analysis course, we will cover a variety of topics, some of which you may find triggering. These topics include descriptive statistics, inferential statistics, and statistical significance. Each time this topic appears in a reading or unit, it is marked on the syllabus. The experience of being triggered versus intellectually challenged are different. The main difference is that an individual must have experienced trauma to experience being triggered, whereas an intellectual challenge has nothing to do with trauma. If you are a trauma survivor and encounter a topic in this class that is triggering for you, you may feel overwhelmed or panicked and find it difficult to concentrate. In response, I encourage you to take the necessary steps for your emotional safety. This may include leaving class while the topic is discussed or talking to a therapist at the Counseling Center. Should you choose to sit out on discussion of a certain topic, know that you are still responsible for the material; but we can discuss if there are other methods for accessing that material, and for assessing your learning on that material. Class topics are discussed for the sole purpose of expanding your intellectual engagement in the area of statistics and data analysis, and I will support you throughout your learning in this course.
